DOM'S DREAM KINGDOM tells the story of a city with a dramatic history, where the silences about past wars and mass murders are so unbearable that only an abandoned dog can trace the secrets and "speak" for the people who still cannot speak for themselves.

The story follows three generations of the family of an old Soviet military pilot – a Korean war veteran – who settle in a city once a cultural centre of Europe, a place variously called Lemberg, Lwów, Lvov, and Lviv. The apartment that this Soviet family has inhabited since the '70s is, by coincidence, the former childhood home of Stanislaw Lem. A Polish writer of Jewish origin, Lem is one of the few survivors of the Holocaust in Lviv, who leaves the city forever after World War II. Because it is hard, if not impossible, for the humans to talk about the city's complicated past and their own traumatic memories of Soviet and Nazi atrocities, it is a dog named Dom who accepts the challenge to pick up the pieces of the family story and Ukraine's history.

Through Dom's voice, Amelina presents a fresh perspective on critical issues such as the supposed east-west divide in Ukraine, themes of migration and displacement, Lviv's history as a major Polish and Jewish metropolis, its dark history with the Holocaust, and its multiple transformations over the tumultuous twentieth century.

Victoria Amelina (1 January 1986–1 July 2023) was a Ukrainian novelist, essayist, poet, and human rights activist. She was a winner of the Joseph Conrad Literary Award (2021), and a finalist for the European Union Prize for Literature finalist (2019) and Lviv UNESCO City of Literature Prize (2018). She was the author of *Fall Syndrome*, as well as two children's books. Victoria's prose and poems have been translated into Polish, Dutch, Italian, Spanish, Hungarian, German, Croatian and English. Victoria wrote both in Ukrainian and English. Her essays have appeared in *Irish Times*, *Dublin Review of Books*, and *Eurozine*. In 2021, she founded a literary festival in the Donetsk region, Ukraine. Victoria died on 1 July 2023 as a result of injuries sustained in a Russian missile strike on a pizza restaurant in Kramatorsk.

Happy love stories are rare in literature, but Sophie Divry rises to the challenge by portraying two lonely souls who are yet to meet.

Bastien Fontaine is a labor inspector vaguely inclined to alcohol and slightly misanthropic. Maïa di Natale is a science journalist, rational and somehow melancholic. Both are grappling with professional challenges: Fontaine is deeply affected by a workplace accident that resulted in a worker's death, shrouded in mystery. Meanwhile, Maïa must navigate the mounting pressures for profitability within the science magazine she is employed by.

In an alternating pattern of chapters that take on the perspectives of Bastien and Maïa, Sophie Divry masterfully orchestrates the coming together of these two lonely souls, whose destinies are, in fact, inherently intertwined. Bastien, unaware, needs Maïa to save him from a danger he doesn't know exists, while Maïa seeks to solve a mystery without realizing that Bastien is the key. Both will be swept up in a thrilling quest all the while escaping their own solitude.

Sophie once again reveals the extent of her talent, delivering a thrilling and moving novel that combines elements of detective fiction, social drama, and romantic comedy.

Sophie Divry worked as a journalist for several years before devoting herself entirely to writing novels. Her first book, *La Cote 400* (2010), was published by Les Allusifs. It was followed by the publication of five other novels, such as *La Condition Pavillonnaire* (Notabilia, 2015), special mention of the Prix Wepler, an essay and a collection of testimonies. Her work has been translated into several languages and unanimously acclaimed by critics.



From one of Thailand's most prominent writers, THE FABULIST is a mesmerizing family saga told in five parts, each by a different narrator and written in a distinctive genre/format.

The story follows four generations of a Thai family, from the matriarch (who was a tree, a naga, a deer, and a rock before she became a woman) to her eldest son, a doctor who embarks upon a quest for justice in the afterlife after suffering a stroke, from the doctor's wife (who lives out the soap opera of her dreams) to a ghostwriter who turns family tragedy into fiction.

Their stories contradict each other and the reader is left with more questions than answers, but all is revealed in the last chapter as a young woman from the next generation returns to her hometown and the truth is finally out.

Uthis Haemamool blends origin myths, recorded history, religious fables and domestic high-drama into THE FABULIST, offering a rare look at Thailand's ordinary people. A challenging but highly satisfying read, just like the best kind of literature.

Uthis Haemamool (b.1975) has published seven novels and four short stories collection, he became widely known for the *Kaeng Khoi* Trilogy containing the novels *The Brotherhood of Kaeng Khoi*, which won him the Seven Book Awards and the S.E.A. Write Award in 2009; *The Elegy*, and THE FABULIST. In 2017, his novel *Silhouette of Desire* was translated and published in Japanese, followed by an art exhibition of the same name that showcases his drawings and paintings. The novel was then adapted for the stage under the direction of Toshiki Okada, which premiered in Bangkok and staged at Centre Pompidou Paris in 2018 and Tokyo in 2019.

From the author of *Scarborough*, *Crosshairs*, and *The Story of Us*, comes a story about the insidiousness of rape culture, centred not on the serial killers but on the people they terrorize, their survivors, and those who were spared.

In 1987, Alma, a young Filipina girl, comes into womanhood while a serial killer is at large in her neighborhood, attacking women and girls. Now a film editor, Alma is the wife of Nira, and mother to her teenage son, Mateo. When Alma has to to edit a true crime series, she remembers coming of age while a serial rapist and killer (who is never named) was attacking women and girls in Scarborough in the late 80s and early 90s.

Weaving today's #MeToo movement with a terrifying chapter in Toronto's history, Behind You turns the whodunit genre on its head by asking the question "Who hasn't done it?" As in, who has not been complicit in sexual harm?

Catherine Hernandez (she/her) is a queer woman of Filipino, Spanish, Chinese, and Indian descent who married into the Navajo Nation. Her first novel, *Scarborough*, was a finalist for Canada Reads 2022, and the film adaptation, for which she wrote the screenplay, won eight Canadian Screen Awards. Her second novel, Crosshairs, was shortlisted for the Toronto Book Award. *The Story of Us*, her third novel, was published in February, 2023.

A dark-humored fable on Palestinian identity, exile and collective memory.

Four Palestinian journalists employed at a Jordanian newspaper are tasked with producing a report for the occasion of the seventieth anniversary of the Nakba, the "ataclysm that upended Palestine in 1948. They are initially confident in the outcome of their assignment to interview an elderly Palestinian who is the last surviving member of his family to have witnessed the catastrophe known as the Nakba. Very soon, however, they are rudely confronted by his seemingly perverse refusal to speak to them - or to anyone - about his background. After the journalists' feet are held to the fire by their editor-in-chief, they grow increasingly desperate to wrest the old man's story from him.

Omar Khalifah's first novel is a breath of fresh air in the Arabic literary landscape. With a well-conducted plot and a sarcastic tone, fairly uncommon in Arabic literature, the writer reflects on the Palestinian identity, in all its nuanced diversity, exile and collective memory, topics that are also at the heart of his academic research.

Of Palestinian background, **Omar Khalifah** grew up in Jordan. He holds a PhD from Columbia University and currently teaches Arabic literature and culture at Georgetown University's Qatar campus. His previous publications include *Nasser in the Egyptian Imaginary* (Edinburgh University Press, 2017) and a short story collection, *Ka'annani Ana* (*As if I Were Myself*), published in 2010. SAND-CATCHER is his first novel.

Told from the perspective of sixteen-year old Plinko, Juiceboxers tenderly traces the stories of four friends, from 9/11 to the election of Donald Trump, from the battlefields of Kandahar to the oilfields of Alberta. Spanning continents and two decades, the novel braids together questions of masculinity and militarism, violence, and the propagation of white supremacist ideology. What does survival look like when war never really ends? How does one process a war that is already being forgotten? The novel chronicles a world unravelling, connecting the War on Terror to the violence against Indigenous people on urban streets. Memory and remembering, friendship and longing, guilt and culpability – all become central to Plinko's experience of the world and his place in it.

Benjamin Hertwig is an artist and writer whose work has appeared in *The New York Times* and *The Globe & Mail* among others. He holds duel Canadian/German citizenship and his debut poetry collection received the Alberta Poetry Prize and was short-listed for three other awards. He has taught writing workshops for inmates, veterans, and secondary students across Canada.



Hannah and Eric are a successful couple living in North London with their three children, and Eric's father Yosef, a survivor of the camps. They are devout Jews who believe in the literal truth of the Old Testament, all except for their youngest son Tovyah. The death of Yosef – the family's link to pre-war Europe – throws the family into disarray. Elsie, the model daughter, disappears for four days, plunging the family into a living nightmare. When she returns, just as mysteriously as she left, she is strangely altered. Witnessing the complete transformation of their daughter's personality and some increasingly hard-to-explain events, Hannah and Eric begin to suspect Elsie is under the influence of black magic. Tovyah, a brilliant university student, believes his sister is suffering a mental collapse caused by his parents' antiquated beliefs. But who is right? And can the family be reconciled before tearing itself apart?

At the heart of the novel are two questions. What does it mean to be bound to an ethical and metaphysical system thousands of years old? And if you reject that system, what is left of your Jewish identity? Through revolving points of view, any certainty in the face of these questions is undermined, and we witness a family trying to reckon with both historical and personal tragedy. The result is a fastpaced literary novel, with elements of horror.

Toby Lloyd was born in London to a secular father and a Jewish mother. He studied English at Oxford University, before moving to America to pursue an MFA in Creative Writing at NYU where he was taught by E.L. Doctorow and Jonathan Safran Foer. Now thirty-three, he's returned to London where he works as a freelance tutor and writer. He has published short stories and essays in various journals, including *Carve Magazine* and *The Los Angeles Review of Books*, and has been shortlisted for the VS Pritchett Prize and for the Jewish Book Week Emerging Writers Programme.



Things haven't been going very well lately for Czesław Przęśnicki. At thirty-five years old, this self-proclaimed "failed writer," a Polish national of Antarctic expression, finds himself interned in a psychiatric hospital in Belgium. A frustrated veterinarian, author of a debut novel that sold six copies, plagued by severe sexual frustration and the anguish of writer's block, Czesław senses that his nerves will soon give way as well. He wanders through the corridors of a strange institution where the patients are named Nabokov, Beckett, Cioran, and even Ionesco. "Flight over a Nest of Geniuses" - all these great figures of exile, accused of having forsaken their mother tongue, must submit to an enigmatic "Bartlebian therapy" meant to set them back on the linguistic straight and narrow.

An astonishingly cosmopolitan novel full of wit and inventiveness, The Palimpsests, beneath its whimsical homage to literature, paints a portrait as touching as it is hilarious of a character in crisis, torn between multiple languages, identities, and masks.

Aleksandra Lun (Gliwice, Poland, 1979) lived in Spain between 1999 and 2010. She studied Spanish language and literature and translation. 




