Joanne Deng writes SECOND LEAD with an eye for the rich visual detail in the performing arts and recounts the story of an actress contending with the issues of class, gender, and family, leading readers down to a self-searching journey.

Huang Cheng grows up with her elder sister Qian, who is twelve years older, as the only role model. Cheng feels she's always shadowed by Qian in every way – looks, age, and even in relationship. Yet, it's Qian who inspires her to pursue a career in acting.

Starting off, Cheng lands only small, unnoticed parts, like being a stand-in or an understudy. Meanwhile, a relationship with a middle-aged director seems to promise a breakthrough for her career, but it ultimately leads nowhere.

Seeking further growth, Cheng moves to London to study a master's degree in performing arts. There she ends her relationship with the director and embarks on a new romance with a pilot-in-training. After graduation, she receives a career-turning acting job in Shanghai, until a tragic accident on set brings the production and her ambition to a halt.

Is being a famous actress all that Cheng sees herself as? Can she take charge and write her own life story?

Joanne Deng is an actress, director, and writer. She earned degrees in Korean language and advertising from National Chengchi University, and an MFA from East 15 Acting School at the University of Essex. Debuting as a model at age eighteen, she began acting at age twenty, and by thirty she was writing and curating exhibitions and performances. Her previous published works include essays and short story collections. SECOND LEAD is her debut novel.

Happy love stories are rare in literature, but Sophie Divry rises to the challenge by portraying two lonely souls who are yet to meet.

Bastien Fontaine is a labor inspector vaguely inclined to alcohol and slightly misanthropic. Maïa di Natale is a science journalist, rational and somehow melancholic. Both are grappling with professional challenges: Fontaine is deeply affected by a workplace accident that resulted in a worker's death, shrouded in mystery. Meanwhile, Maïa must navigate the mounting pressures for profitability within the science magazine she is employed by.

In an alternating pattern of chapters that take on the perspectives of Bastien and Maïa, Sophie Divry masterfully orchestrates the coming together of these two lonely souls, whose destinies are, in fact, inherently intertwined. Bastien, unaware, needs Maïa to save him from a danger he doesn't know exists, while Maïa seeks to solve a mystery without realizing that Bastien is the key. Both will be swept up in a thrilling quest all the while escaping their own solitude.

Sophie once again reveals the extent of her talent, delivering a thrilling and moving novel that combines elements of detective fiction, social drama, and romantic comedy.

Sophie Divry worked as a journalist for several years before devoting herself entirely to writing novels. Her first book, *La Cote 400* (2010), was published by Les Allusifs. It was followed by the publication of five other novels, such as *La Condition Pavillonnaire* (Notabilia, 2015), special mention of the Prix Wepler, an essay and a collection of testimonies. Her work has been translated into several languages and unanimously acclaimed by critics.



Exploring the repercussions of a woman's decision to hide her Métis identity while living in a small, predominately white prairie town in the 1940s, WILD PEOPLE QUIET examines the issues of passing and internalized racism and the complexities of learned and lived identities in subtle, taut and unnerving prose.

It's 1946, and Florence has spent years living in Torduvalle working as a secretary and maintaining a private and respectable life. But when a friend from her past arrives in town, her carefully constructed world is thrown into turmoil. Florence attempts to prevent the truth from surfacing, but finds herself being drawn back to her culture and community despite herself. Soon, it becomes impossible to live two separate lives.

WILD PEOPLE QUIET explores the choice some Métis faced – to steadfastly maintain their Métis identity against opposition, or to conceal it to live an easier life. But how does this choice impact lives? Florence's journey examines the repercussions experienced by those who can pass, and the struggles of those who can't.

Tara Gereaux (Métis-Settler) has published a novel, *Saltus* (Nightwood Editions, 2021), and a teen novella, *Size of a Fist* (Thistledown Press, 2015), and her work has appeared in various literary magazines. She's been shortlisted for the 2022 ReLit Novel Award, and received a 2022 Endowment Award from the Saskatchewan Foundation of the Arts and a REVEAL Indigenous Arts Award from the Hnatyshyn Foundation.



Following her father's sudden death, Ari Ko returns to her hometown to host a three-day funeral. Her previous published works include short stories collection and a novel, *The Partisan's Daughter*, which is considered a precursor of MY FATHER'S LIBERATION.





A searing debut novel from Indigenous Voices Award nominee Blair Palmer Yoxall, TREAT THEM AS BUFFALO is a classic Western from an indigenous perspective set during the 1885 North-West Resistance, following a series of disappearances of young boys from a frontier town in Saskatchewan.

Told from the precocious and contemplative perspective of twelve-year-old Nikosis (Niko) Eriksen, a Métis boy from Northern Sas-katchewan, TREAT THEM AS BUFFALO launches us headfirst into the onset of the North-West Resistance in Spring of 1885. When Niko's cousin Guillaume (Cousin) is abducted in broad daylight, it turns out to be the first in a series of kidnappings of local Métis boys, sending the community into frenzied paranoia.

When word breaks that a missing boy was recovered alive, but castrated, the need to find Cousin becomes all the more pressing. As the resistance rages on and the search for Cousin continues, Niko's family's safety in town is threatened. When Niko discovers the true identity of the man responsible for the kidnappings, he is forced to grapple with his own identity and his truth, and resolves to fight to bring Cousin back from his clutches, no matter what it takes.

Blair Palmer Yoxall (he/him/his) is a writer and poet. His fiction won the 2015 Striking Prose Competition Sponsored by Terry Whitehead and the 2019 James Patrick Folinsbee Prize in English, and has been shortlisted for a 2017 Norma Epstein Foundation Award and a 2019 Indigenous Voices Award. His poetry and fiction have appeared in glass buffalo, The Fiddlehead, and Carving Space: The Indigenous Voices Awards Anthology. Blair is a citizen of the Métis Nation of Alberta and of Métis and settler parentage. He holds an M.A. in English in Indigenous Literatures and Westerns, and enjoys fly-fishing in the Alberta Rockies. TREAT THEM AS BUFFALO is his debut novel. Follow him on Instagram @atayookee.

Marguerite Périgord is locked in the attic of her family home, a disintegrating Chelsea house, with a Singer sewing machine, a copy of Mrs Beeton's Book of Household Management and a taxidermied bat with the feet of a duck. She has been confined by her mother, Cécile, who is concerned about her engagement to an older, nearpenniless solicitor and wishes to educate her daughter on proper married conduct, lest she drag the family's good name into disrepute.

Marguerite's weeks are punctuated by small but highly decadent meals brought by her mother, by letters from her betrothed and by her attempts to memorise the writings of Mrs Beeton, who knows everything there is to know about mainstream femininity and how to be a woman. When a carrion crow begins to nest in a hole in the attic, Marguerite befriends the creature and becomes jealous of its freedom, leading her to reappraise her situation and reconsider her mother's intentions. How long has she been in the attic, why are her fiancé's letters becoming more distant, and is the Périgord name really something to be so proud of?

Albert Tam graduated from the University of London and earned his MBA from the University of Bradford. 




