

An exhilarating debut novel about a child whose literal enlightenment sets the stage for an exuberant tragicomedy of marriage, religion, and parenthood.

On an otherwise ordinary fall day on a university campus in Chicago, the toddler son of an ambitious divinity school professor named Adrian Bennett mysteriously starts to glow. The nimbus, as the strange, soft light comes to be known, offers no clues to its origin and frustrates every attempt at rational explanation.

Though the nimbus appears only intermittently, and not to everyone, the otherworldly glow quickly upends the lives of all those who encounter it, including Paul Harkin, Adrian's broke and feckless graduate student, who likes being a graduate student a little too much for his own good; Renata Bennett, Adrian's omnicompetent wife, who can't see her son glowing even though the nimbus is turning her life upside down; and Warren Kayita, a down-on-his-luck librarian and aging div school alumnus on the run from a violent criminal. As news about the nimbus spreads around the university and beyond, Adrian, Paul, Renata, and Warren are set on a collision course that will threaten their lives and put their deepest convictions to the test.

At once a rollicking intellectual satire, a searing portrait of a family in crisis, and a thrilling metaphysical page-turner, THE NIMBUS offers a comic and profound examination of the persistence of spiritual belief in a secular age and humanity's timeless search for meaning.

Robert P. Baird holds a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago Divinity School, and has worked as an editor at *The New Yorker*, *Harper's Magazine*, *The Paris Review*, *Esquire*, and *Chicago Review*. He has written for all those places, as well as for The *New York Times*, *The London Review of Books*, *The Guardian*, and *Poetry*, among other publications.

The narrator of PHOTO UPON REQUEST is a young man in his twenties, in search of emotions and validation. At the root of his wanderings is his father's illness, who is battling cancer and whose days are numbered. He lives in a shared apartment, looks for a job, meets men on Grindr, and supplements his income by offering sexual services through the app Giton.

When he sees that black-and-white photo, hanging above a bed - a young man with his body folded, his toe brought to his mouth like a child's thumb, the shock is sudden, brutal. Who is this man? What is his story? Thus begins an investigation that gradually takes on the shape of a rebirth.

PHOTO UPON REQUEST paints a poignant portrait of a young man in search meaning. Don't be deceived by its brilliant nonchalance. Beneath the surface, the emotion builds, intensifying until it grips you by the throat.



A young boy. A single mistake. Many lives changed forever.

Gerard is twelve. He loves flying round the streets of Glasgow on his bike, or mucking about with his gang, the Broncos. He's a bright kid, but trouble seems to follow him. No one knows what it's like at home for Gerard; he's used to carrying a lot on his small shoulders.

Gerard doesn't always make good decisions. And on one April morning, he makes a very bad one — one that will upend his whole world — and the worlds of two women he encounters in a moment that changes all their lives. For Margaret, the shocking incident brings her back from the edge of grief; for Clare it's the start of a new friendship that she desperately needs to propel her forward.

Gerard faces a bewildering stream of concerned adults clutching files, unfamiliar streets to navigate, a strange bed to sleep in, and the very real chance he won't see his wee brother and sister again. But is there, finally, a more hopeful future ahead for all three of them?

Heartbreaking, and yet brimful of humour, compassion and hope, THIS BRIGHT LIFE is a story about messy lives, second chances and the many hands it takes to build a good life.

Karen Campbell is originally from Glasgow, and now lives in south west Scotland. She graduated with distinction from Glasgow University's Creative Writing Masters, and won an SAC New Writers Award and a Creative Scotland Bursary. Before turning to writing, she was a police officer in Glasgow, then press officer with Glasgow City Council. She also tutors in creative writing and was Writer in Residence at Dumfries & Galloway Council. The disconnect between what we see on the surface and the reality underneath runs through much of her work, with Karen going on to write novels such as *This Is Where I Am* (Bloomsbury 2013), which was a Radio 4 Book at Bedtime. Her eighth novel, *Paper Cut* (Canongate 2022) was a Waterstones Scotland Book of the Month and won the 2023 Blairgowrie Bookmark Prize. Karen's appeared on Radio 4 Women's Hour, Radio 3's The Verb, Radio Scotland and BBC television's Big Scottish Book Club.

True Grit meets Annihilation in a supernatural ride through the violent, collapsing dream of the great American frontier.

In the Pacific Northwest of 1876, a dragon is causing widespread fear and delusion among those who encounter it. Gentle Montgomery, who has led a quiet life with his business partner and best friend Liam O'Kelly, selling tinctures and studying alchemy, finds his world shattered when Liam drowns while pursuing the creature, believing it to be a mythical salamander that holds the secret to eternal life. Devastated, Gentle vows to find the monster to resurrect Liam, but his quest is complicated by the arrival of Kitt, his fourteen-year-old nephew, who is fleeing their abusive family.

Despite wanting to protect Kitt, Gentle reluctantly becomes his guardian as they journey into the perilous Olympic Peninsula, where the dragon's influence brings forth horrors from both nature and humanity. As they track the salamander, they realize they are not alone in the hunt and must confront their own troubled pasts, uncovering dark truths about the American West.

Imaginative and gripping, THE GREAT WORK is a hard-charging yet deeply felt story about the toxic myth of American expansion, the demands of masculinity and the strange territory of male friendship, and what it means to form a family. A speculative Western with the racing pulse of a supernatural thriller or horror novel, the novel will appeal to genre-bending readers of *Red Rabbit*, or those drawn to books like *Our Wives Under the Sea* or *Our Share of Night* which mix magic with serious thematic and emotional impact.

Sheldon Costa is a writer originally from Post Falls, Idaho. His fiction has appeared in or is forthcoming from *Electric Literature, Michigan Quarterly Review, Conjunctions, The Georgia Review,* and *Crazyhorse,* among others. He is a winner of the AWP Intro Journal Project, the 2018 Helen Earnhart Harley Creative Writing Fellowship Award, and the Cream City Review's 2019 Summer Prize in Fiction, judged by Ramona Ausubel. A timeless story of self-discovery and the search for identity, chronicling Ophelia Blue Rivers' struggles to find her place in the world while being raised by the indomitable Grandma Blue, an old Black descendent of Cherokee freedmen in rural South Carolina in the 1990s.

Ophelia is perpetually not fitting in and must reconcile the loss of the family she never had with the imperfect reality of the one that has her. She has no simple answers to the questions troubling her: "Who am I?" "Where do I belong?" "Why is my family so scattered?" Ghosts return, patterns repeat, myths become reality, and the lush southern landscape persists like time itself.

BLACK CHEROKEE is at once a vital portrait of 1990s American life and an intensely imaginative, lyrical meditation on family, love and belonging.

Antonio Michael Downing is the author of Saga Boy (Penguin / PRH and Milkweed) – an acclaimed memoir admired by both Giller winner lan Williams, who called it "...the triumph of Blackness everywhere," and Kiese Laymon, who called it: "Singularly dazzling..." He has been shortlisted for several awards including as emerging author at the 2019 Taylor Prize and the 2021 Speaker's Book Award. A singularly ambitious, creatively adventurous novel that draws on history, the imagination, and Homer's *Iliad* to offer a fresh and original take on the Trojan War, and on the conflicts and losses incurred in the quest for a meaningful life.

A man arrives on a foreign shore. His expedition holds promise and he has high hopes. He strives mightily. It all goes wrong. He has much he could say about that, but his story is lost – until another man arrives on another foreign shore, he too with high hopes.

Psoas of Midea is a goatherd's son who leaves his wife and children behind in order to help Menelaus get his beautiful wife back. His story is discovered 30 centuries later by a scholar who has left his own wife and child behind in order to accept a fellowship at Oxford where he is intrigued by papyrus fragments he believes comprise a lost Trojan War epic, the Psoad.

SON OF NOBODY is composed in two voices: the first, a series of fragments from antiquity that tell the epic story of Troy from a lost, alt-Homeric tradition; the second, the voice of the modern-day scholar who assembles and comments on these fragments while navigating a conflict of his own.

By centering his tale on the story of a commoner, Martel upends the regal perspective of the Epic Cycle, which has been handed down to us through millennia; by providing a dual storyline, he offers a poignant glimpse into the foibles that lead to the folly of war, and those that lead to the folly of failed relationships.

For its sheer inventiveness, puzzle-like quality, and mingling of the serious and the playful, SON OF NOBODY is both thoroughly unique and distinctly Yann Martel.

Yann Martel is the author of the Man Booker Prize-winning novel *Life of Pi*, a #1 international bestseller that has been published in more than 50 territories, sold more than 15 million copies, spent more than a year on *The New York Times* best-seller list, and been adapted into an Oscar-winning film and a Broadway play. Martel is also the author of the novels *The High Mountains of Portugal, Beatrice and Virgil*, and *Self*, the collection of stories *The Facts Behind the Helsinki Roccamatios*, and *101 Letters to a Prime Minister*. North Korea, 1950: Oksoon believes that the war is finally over in Pyeongyang. The Americans are here to stay, she's told, but her father and eldest brother have gone south and she anxiously waits for their return. When the Chinese army unexpectedly attacks, Oksoon must flee with her mother and second brother in search of safety and to reunite their family. Journeying from freezing winter in the rural north to the seedy back alleys of Seoul during the summer, Oksoon and her family fall in with an unlikely group of miscreants – a prostitute, a baduk gambler, an opportunistic ferryman – and question how far they'll go, and what moral boundaries they'll cross, to find their missing relatives.

Meanwhile, far to the south near Jinju, Oksoon's close cousin Junho flees the war to find refuge at the Lord's Beloved Home for Children. As the orphanage struggles to keep its doors open, Junho is put in charge of drafting letters to rich American benefactors, convincing them to send money to Korea. But when the enigmatic orphanage director brings her aristocratic niece to stay at the Home – a beautiful young woman harboring a secret – Junho finds himself caught between his impulse for survival and his growing affections, which put him at risk of being expelled from the only safe place he knows.

As Oksoon and Junho make their way towards each other and eventually unite, they fight to save themselves and hold their family together, even as the war threatens to tear everything apart. Told in alternating points of view, LETTERS TO ANOTHER HOME highlights the tension between personal dreams and duty to family, the power of resilience, and how choices made in a brief moment have consequences that reverberate for lifetimes.

Bora Lee Reed was born in Seoul, South Korea, and immigrated to the U.S. as a young child. She grew up in Southern California, among a vibrant Korean immigrant community. She holds an MFA from Warren Wilson College and has been awarded residences from Hedgebrook, Ragdale, and UCross. Bora, a Reese's Book Club LitUp Fellow, now lives in Berkeley, CA, where she works as the director of communications for UC Berkeley's public policy school.

Heather Aimee O'Neill's masterful THE IRISH GOODBYE is a hearty, engrossing debut, an exploration of how family ties can both lift and limit, and a celebration of the complicated bonds of sisterhood.

It's been years since the three Ryan sisters were all home at the same time. Two decades ago their lives were upended by an accident on their brother Topher's boat: a friend's brother was killed, the lawsuit nearly bankrupted their parents, and Topher spiraled into suicide. Now the Ryan women are back for Thanksgiving, hungry to reconnect – and each sister is carrying a heavy secret. The eldest, Cait, feels responsible for the crash, and is rekindling a flame with her high school crush Luke - Topher's best friend, and the brother of the boy who died. Middle sister Alice's surprise pregnancy threatens the career she's restarting after raising kids, but she worries her marriage will be equally doomed if she terminates. And the youngest, Maggie, is finally taking the risk of bringing a woman she loves home to her Irish Catholic mother, at the same time deeply regretting her recent reunion with her ex. Infusing everything is the grief for Topher that none of the Ryans have figured out how to carry together instead of separately.

When Cait invites Luke to Thanksgiving dinner, old tensions boil over and new truths surface, nearly overpowering the flickering light of their family bond. Far more than a family holiday will be ruined unless the sisters can find a way to forgive themselves-and each other.

THE DISSENTERS is a tour de force, a transgressive novel about love and revolution that spans seventy years of Egyptian history.

Amna, Nimo, Mouna – these are all names for a single Egyptian woman whose life has mirrored that of her country. After her death in 2015, her son, Nour, ascends to the attic of their house where he dreams of his mother in a series of ever more immersive visions: Amna as a young woman forced into an arranged marriage in the 1950s; a coquettish student of French known to her confidents as Nimo; a self-made divorcee and a lover; a "pious mama" donning her hijab; and, finally, a feminist activist during the Arab Spring. A year in the life of a restless woman who resists the temptation to run away from her disheveled life, and tries instead to make a familiar world unfamiliar, and a small life big.

A Scottish woman has moved across the ocean, to a grubby, overpriced apartment in a town deep in the Canadian mountains, to be with a man. To stop herself from running away, for a year she devises weekly projects to keep herself in one place. Taking lessons from ascetics and anchoresses, adventurers and artists, she seeks to make her small world big and the familiar unfamiliar. She tries to accept the undesirable parts of her life. She thinks if she can just find a way of loving all that, she will accept her fate of living far from family and friends, four thousand miles across the sea.

The projects are varied, and they often break down amid bouts of homesickness. She photographs everything she dislikes in an attempt to turn that hate into love, practices walking barefoot, follows wolf and lynx tracks through the frost, writes letters advocating for foraging and birds, learns a Hebridean chant, sleeps in snow banks, and dreams up meetings with foxes and cabbages. She immerses herself, and the reader, in disappointment and wonder, loss and hope. Ultimately, she asks, can we accept our situation while also taking control of our story?

Set in Canada and Scotland, interspersed with beautifully curated black and white photographs, and rich in atmosphere like an old tapestry woven through with the strange, bright threads of these times, HOVEL is an act of foraging – a fusion of lived moments and imagined ones that brings readers on a fresh trip through the instants that define us humans, and as beings.

For fans of Claire-Louise Bennett's *Pond*, Kyo Maclear's *Birds Art Life*, Sheila Heti's *Motherhood*, and Doireann Ní Ghríofa's *A Ghost in the Throat*.

Let me not be one of them, one of the many who belong nowhere. Let me have this place of my own making.

ASHLAND is, in the author's words, "a story that's been with me for so long that I think it really happened even though I made it up." In rich and beautiful language, and in a chorus of many voices, Simon tells the story of a once booming New Hampshire mill town, bounded by dammed rivers and checkered with fallow fields, and of a family stubbornly clinging to their home, their land, and their memories.

Ellie and Jennie's mother – Carolyn's grandmother – abandoned her two daughters when they were small, chasing a dream of freedom, a fact of which Carolyn is secretly proud. Ellie and Jennie each declared their own independence, in a sense. Ellie gave birth to Carolyn at the age of 17, and Jennie gave birth to her daughter Marie at 14. Neither married their children's fathers. By novel's end, we learn that Carolyn, too, is pregnant and on her own.

ASHLAND doesn't follow a linear progression, rather the narration is passed like a baton from Carolyn to Jennie, to Jennie's partner, Andy, to Ellie and Carolyn's nearest neighbors, Edith and Gordon; and to Carolyn's writing professor, Geoff. Each character shares their story of love and loss, their bitter or ecstatic attachment to the land, their yearning for connection or freedom. Patterns repeat, for good or ill, and tragedies and choices echo through the generations. But the final word is with Carolyn, on the cusp of adulthood (and motherhood). She is the writer and keeper of memories, forever recovering the past and making a place for herself to belong.

Finally, award-winning author **Chan Ho-Kei** brings everything back to his native Hong Kong, rewriting history and transforming the backstory into a brilliant mix of science fiction, Chinese mythology, and Lovecraftian horror.
