

Pachinko meets Beasts of a Little Land in this richly imagined, emotionally gripping novel about a Korean woman's quest for freedom and self-determination, and the courageous women who risk everything to help each other in a world stacked against them.

In 1924, Korea is an occupied country. In Seoul's secret, underground networks and throughout the countryside, rebellion against the Japanese Empire simmers, threatening to boil over. Kim Na-Young lives a simple life in the rural village of Daegeori, where she watches the moon rise and set over the pine-wooded mountains, tends to her household alongside her best friend, Yeon-Soo, and cares for her sick mother.

But the occupation touches every Korean life – even Na-Young's. In the wake of a tragedy that stuns the village, Na-Young's father arranges her marriage to a man she's never met, and Na-Young and Yeon-Soo decide to flee, taking their fate into their own hands. That decision sets them on their own collision course with the occupying forces, resulting in a violent encounter that will alter both their lives forever – in shockingly different ways.

Taking us from a small village to the bustling corridors of Seoul, where women and girls can learn to read and write in multiple languages and members of the revolution pass coded messages through the back rooms of teahouses, Ann Y.K. Choi weaves a masterful tale of one woman taking command, not only of her own identity, but her own destiny.

A sweeping journey through historical Korea and an utterly compelling portrait of one woman's remarkable life, ALL THINGS UNDER THE MOON is both a stunning literary achievement and a beautifully written tribute to the sacrifices women make for each othwer.

Ann Choi originally from Chung-Ju, South Korea, is a Toronto-based author and educator. Her debut novel, *Kay's Lucky Coin Variety*, was shortlisted for the Toronto Book Awards. Choi teaches creative writing at the University of Toronto, School of Continuing Studies.



When six-year-old Laurel Taylor vanishes without a trace, her family is left shattered, struggling to navigate the darkness of grief and unanswered questions. As their search turns to despair, Laurel's older sister, Nadine, begins experiencing nightmares that blur the line between dream and reality, and she becomes convinced that Laurel's disappearance could be connected to other family tragedies. Guided by her elders, Nadine sets out to uncover whether laying the ghosts to rest is the key to finding her sister and healing her fractured family.

Carson Faust captivates in this chilling literary debut that confronts the specter of colonization and the generational scars it leaves on Native American families. Steeped in Indigenous folklore and drawing from the author's own family history, If the Dead Belong Here examines what it means to be haunted—both by the supernatural and by terrors of our own making. Faust crafts a powerful, kaleidoscopic tale about the complicated legacies of violence that shape our present, the importance of honoring our past, and the resilience of a family—and a people—determined to heal from old wounds.

Carson Faust is two-spirit, and an enrolled member of the Edisto Natchez-Kusso Tribe of South Carolina. He is the recipient of artist fellowships and residencies from the McKnight Foundation, the Jerome Foundation, and the Camargo Foundation. His fiction has appeared in *TriQuarterly, ANMLY, Waxwing Magazine*, among other journals, and has been anthologized in *Never Whistle at Night: An Indigenous Dark Fiction Anthology* (Vintage, 2023). He lives in Minnesota, where he is at work on a second novel.



Nine years ago, Yuhwoon fled Seoul with her aunt as a mysterious virus swept through the city, transforming those affected into trees. In the chaos, they had no time to save Yuhwoon's mother, and leaving her behind has haunted Yuhwoon ever since.

Now a virologist, Yuhwoon finally has the chance to return home. The Korean government is launching an ambitious anti-virus system, Umbrella, designed to wipe out the virus once and for all. However, when the Umbrella task force suddenly falls silent and loses contact with the government, Yuhwoon volunteers to enter the wall-sealed quarantined city to figure out what happened to the team, to the system, and most of all, to learn whether her mother has truly become one of the human-trees that stalk her nightmares.

Armed with only a tablet, a collection box, and accompanied by a government-issued AI humanoid called R, Yuhwoon ventures into Seoul. What awaits her is beyond imagination: a city overtaken by ghostly forests of human-trees, their leaves whispering and humming like swarms of bees, and a boy who has somehow resisted the virus. As Yuhwoon digs deeper, she realizes the truth behind the Umbrella project may be far more sinister than the virus itself.

Beautifully crafted and profoundly mesmerizing, HUMMING is a post-apocalyptic eco-thriller that pushes readers to confront what it truly means to be human-- and what lines we cross in the name of survival.

North Korea, 1950: Oksoon believes that the war is finally over in Pyeongyang. The Americans are here to stay, she's told, but her father and eldest brother have gone south and she anxiously waits for their return. When the Chinese army unexpectedly attacks, Oksoon must flee with her mother and second brother in search of safety and to reunite their family. Journeying from freezing winter in the rural north to the seedy back alleys of Seoul during the summer, Oksoon and her family fall in with an unlikely group of miscreants and question how far they'll go, and what moral boundaries they'll cross, to find their missing relatives.

Meanwhile, far to the south near Jinju, Oksoon's close cousin Junho flees the war to find refuge at the Lord's Beloved Home for Children. As the orphanage struggles to keep its doors open, Junho is put in charge of drafting letters to rich American benefactors, convincing them to send money to Korea. But when the enigmatic orphanage director brings her aristocratic niece to stay at the Home – a beautiful young woman harboring a secret – Junho finds himself caught between his impulse for survival and his growing affections, which put him at risk of being expelled from the only safe place he knows. As Oksoon and Junho make their way towards each other and eventually unite, they fight to save themselves and hold their family together, even as the war threatens to tear everything apart.

Told in alternating points of view, SONG FOR ANOTHER HOME highlights the tension between personal dreams and duty to family, the power of resilience, and how choices made in a brief moment have consequences that reverberate for lifetimes. It tells a powerful story about what it means to build a life for yourself and your family against all odds.

Bora Lee Reed was born in Seoul, South Korea, and immigrated to the U.S. as a young child. She grew up in Southern California, among a vibrant Korean immigrant community. She holds an MFA from Warren Wilson College and has been awarded residences from Hedgebrook, Ragdale, and UCross. Bora, a Reese's Book Club LitUp Fellow, now lives in Berkeley, CA, where she works as the director of communications for UC Berkeley's public policy school.



Thirteen—year—old Lydia and her family are grappling with what peace—after decades of war—might mean for their future, just as they welcome a new relative into their home: Berekhet, a cousin newly arrived from Ethiopia to attend medical school. Berekhet encourages Lydia to confront a barrage of new ideas for the first time, about nationhood, family, and what it means to be truly free. Meanwhile, her mother, Elsa, a former rebel fighter, and the family matriarch, Mama Zewdi, contend with regrets and secrets long—buried—secrets that the emboldened Lydia is determined to uncover, including the truth about her martyred father.

Written with warmth and sharp humor, Bsrat Mezghebe's mesmerizing debut novel is a loving ode to an immigrant community on the cusp of a new age.





A lyrical debut novel about survival, memory, and the search for home in its many forms.

A vivid and deeply affecting portrayal of a family in crisis narrated by 12-year-old Sofia, a bookish and diligent girl, who has been living in a car with her mother, Nina, and younger brother, Rafa, since a blow-up at home forced them to flee.

Sofias' father had been having an affair with a younger woman and had even moved her into the house (installing her in Sophia's bedroom) when she got pregnant, but her mother only decided to leave after he struck Rafa at the breakfast table over a spilled glass of juice. Now Sofia finds herself absent from her life –her school, her friends–and forced to adapt to life on the margins.

The novel unfolds in a series of short vignettes capturing the fault lines of an existence marked by economic insecurity. As they move between parking lots and temporary shelters, cycling through hope and despair, we observe through Sofia's eyes the mess the adults have made of their lives. Sofia watches as her mother contemplates impossible choices, catches glimpses of kindness and cruelty from strangers, and tries to carve out a space and an identity for herself while grappling with her family's disintegration.

Amanda Rizkalla is a recent Steinbeck Fellow and Wisconsin Institute for Creative Writing Fellow. Her work has been nominated for the Pushcart Prize and appears in *Boston Review, No Tokens Journal*, and elsewhere. After graduating from Stanford University, she received her MFA from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where she was the 2020-21 Kemper Knapp Fellow. She has been a writer-in-residence at Hedgebrook, Djerassi, Blue Mountain Center, Monson Arts, Kimmel Harding Nelson Center for the Arts, and Mountain Words, and has received support from the Barbara Deming Memorial Fund and the Pruitt-Meinke Fellowship.

A witty, charming, and heartfelt novel about the many fabled lives of a dog named Wolf – hunter, guardian, guide, healer, friend. Dancing across genres and cultures, space and time, WOLF, MOON, DOG is as insightful about human nature as it is about canine behavior.

In a hard and hungry season thousands of years ago, a young wolf is turfed out of his pack and left to fend for himself among strange, clever new animals who walk on two legs, hunt with detachable claws and teeth, eat meat but wastefully discard the bones, and tend fire as part of their pack.

Eventually, one of these young animals carefully approaches Wolf. He explains that he's a human, and that his kind and Wolf's kind aren't so different: they hunt the same prey, they're hunted by the same predators, and they need help surviving. The boy proposes a deal: Wolf will stand watch at night and alert the humans if danger approaches, and in exchange the humans will reward him with one meaty bone a day. Wolf agrees to the arrangement on a trial basis and over time grows closer to the boy, giving into an inexplicable urge to seek companionship with humans. And so, Wolf becomes dog.

In WOLF, MOON, DOG we follow Wolf as he reincarnates through the ages, from Ancient Egypt to Alexandrian Greece to the Space Race and all the way to a dark future beset by climate change. Indeed, Wolf dies many times over, but each of his lives is uniquely meaningful, unleashing different aspects of humankind's best friend. In Wharton's novel and fable, dogs are deeply empathetic creatures who experience a breadth of emotions and a desire for self-determination much the way we do.

Thomas Wharton is the internationally published author of several acclaimed books. His debut *Icefields* won the Commonwealth Writers' Prize for Best First Book and was a Canada Reads selection, while *Salamander* and *The Logogryph* were shortlisted for major national and international awards. His most recent novel, *The Book of Rain*, was a finalist for the Writers' Trust Fiction Prize and the Georges Bugnet Award, with rights sold in France and Russia. He lives near Edmonton, Alberta.



Claire grew up with the legend of the Unsinkable Mounsey Women. Fanny, her great-great-grandmother, made headlines in 1915 for washing ashore in England nearly a year after her ship sank. Fanny's daughter Sarah went to collect her mother on a British ocean liner named the Lusitania—whose sinking she, too, survived. Their improbable survivals led them to success on the vaudeville circuit and as Midwestern icons. But Claire never knew the full story—until now.

Listless, jobless and recently canceled for extolling dangerous skincare advice online that sent a reader to the hospital, Claire is surprised when a knock at the door turns out to be the police, looking for answers about a 1970s cold case they suspect her mother, Kath, may know something about. As the cops zero in, Claire demands answers from her mother.

Kath's comically long response, which blossoms into the story of the Mounseys and their descendants writ large, moves from a Liverpudlian poorhouse at the onset of World War I to a Lake Michigan lighthouse in 1971 (when "sex was freer and McDonald's fried their potatoes with beef tallow") to present-day Chicagoland, and along the way, offers Claire a richer understanding of everything she shares with the complicated, resilient women she descends from.

Replete with inappropriately old boyfriends, dubious medical professionals, and more than a few boats, THE RESPONSIBLE PARTY is the story of several women, in several different timelines, trying to stay afloat.

Claire Carusillo is a beauty and culture writer from Illinois. She now lives in Midway, Utah, where she is the co-owner of the forthcoming Storyboard, a bookstore, a skate shop, and coffee bar. She has an MFA in Fiction from Columbia University, where she was a teaching fellow. Her writing has appeared all over the internet, including Gawker, New York Magazine, Elle, and her newsletter That Wet Look.

When she was just thirteen years old, Sofia was taken—by two people she had never seen before—to a "therapeutic wilderness program" three states away. Her own mother, terrified that Sofia was spiraling out of control, had enrolled her in an institution for "troubled teens." But instead of finding healing, Sofia found herself trapped. Trapped inside an unregulated industry that used promises of intervention and reform to prey upon panicking parents and kids with court orders.

Over the next two years, Sofia would cycle through four different residential programs. In these places, school hours were a privilege, not a right. Contact with the outside world, including her mother, was strictly monitored. Teenage inmates were encouraged to call one another out. Still a child—ripped from her home, stripped of basic freedoms, and severed from her family and friends—Sofia struggled to understand who she really was beneath the crushing weight of the label BAD KID.

A darkly funny and intimate coming-of-age tale, this graphic memoir exposes the harrowing realities of adolescence in and out of the "troubled teen" industry of the early 2000s. And in doing so, Bad Kid explores the lasting impact of the labels we're given—and how making art can help transmute them.

Sofia Szamosi is the author and illustrator of *Unretouchable* (Graphic Universe, 2022) and *Bad Kid* (Algonquin, forthcoming 2025). A number of university libraries have added Sofia's work to their collections and her fine art has been shown in group and solo shows in New York City, Chicago and Detroit. Her illustrations have been featured in publications such as Loose Threads, Sleek Magazine and Vice. She received her BA with honors from NYU's Gallatin School for Individualized Study in 2017. She is the illustrator for *Whole Girl* by Sadie Radinsky (Sounds True, 2021). She now resides in Northampton, Massachusetts


